BACKGROUND SECTION

NATIONAL OPIOID SETTLEMENTS

BRIEF BACKGROUND

The opioid epidemic has taken an enormous toll on individuals and communities across the nation. More than 25,400 Missourians have lost their lives due to an overdose during the past 20 years.

Every state in the United States, including Missouri, sued one or more companies that allegedly contributed to the opioid crisis. Many counties, municipalities, and other political subdivisions also sued. A bipartisan committee of state attorneys general has negotiated, and continues to negotiate, national settlements. These settlements only bind political subdivisions that agree to join, and the more subdivisions that join, the more money the state as a whole receives. Missouri and its subdivisions could receive more than \$950 million over 20 years if full settlement participation is achieved. This funding will provide the state with desperately needed resources for opioid abatement and treatment.


As of October 2025, settlements continue to be negotiated and finalized by the state and its political subdivisions.

PURPOSE OF SETTLEMENT FUNDS

Fighting Addiction, Saving Lives

Road to Recovery



It is the intent of the Settlement Agreements that payments be used for Opioid Remediation, as defined in the Settlement Agreements.

Funds are intended to save lives and help individuals experiencing (or at risk of developing) opioid use disorder, so the individuals can access the services needed to start a life of recovery in the community. Funds can also support families and communities to assist these individuals.

OPIOID REMEDIATION (as defined by the settlements) - the care, treatment, and other programs and expenditures designed to:

1. Address the misuse and abuse of opioid products;
2. Treat or mitigate opioid use or related disorders; or
3. Mitigate other alleged effects of, including on those injured as a result of, the opioid epidemic.

In 2023, DMH worked with the Attorney General's Office (AGO), the Missouri Association of Counties (MAC), and the Missouri Municipal League (MML) to develop a coordinated reporting mechanism that meets state MOU and national settlement requirements.

Coordinated reporting is a long-term project. For as long as settlement payments are distributed and/or expended, reports will be required.

DMH will continue to coordinate the reporting effort, which could continue beyond 2040.

RECEIPT AND EXPENDITURE OF SETTLEMENT FUNDS

Funds do not have to be expended in the same year/fiscal year received.
Funds will be paid by multiple settlements at various points during the year.

Spending

There is no time limit on the expenditure of funds after funds are paid to the State or local governments.

Since reporting will be required until all funds are expended, OSF should be tracked separately.



SETTLEMENT TERMS SECTION

REQUIRED BY MISSOURI'S MOU

Signed by the State and all participating local governments (*ongoing settlements*).

Recipients to provide the MO General Assembly a report detailing funds received, how funds were spent, and whether each expenditure fits within an approved use. (*Section F, #42*)

Recipients must verify settlement funds are being utilized in a manner consistent with the Approved Uses. (*Section F, #41*)

Any political subdivision that cannot use its settlement funds for Approved Uses as required by the MOU may remit their allocated share to the State to be deposited in the Opioid Addiction Treatment and Recovery Fund. (*Section C, #29*)

REQUIRED BY SETTLEMENTS AGREEMENTS

All agreements outline the list of allowable uses.

Exhibit E provides a non-exhaustive list of expenditures that qualify as Opioid Remediation.

Reminders are sent with each payment reiterating the intended use of 100% of funds on Opioid Remediation (*ongoing settlements*).

Reminders include references to the possibility of penalties for noncompliance (*ongoing settlements*).

WHAT IF FUNDS ARE NOT SPENT ON ALLOWABLE USES?

Agreements are not clear on the actual consequences of non-remediation use. It is too early in the payout process to have examples of enforcement actions for non-compliance. However, there could be actions taken in the future:

If state and local governments do not want to risk paying back non-allowable uses in the future, make sure all payments are spent on allowable uses.

POTENTIAL CONSEQUENCES

Possible Consequences

Based on the language in the agreements, the consequence of excessive non-remediation uses could potentially include any recourse available to a non-breaching party under applicable law.

The defendants (opioid manufacturers, distributors, pharmacies) in the opioid settlements might, for example, take the position that the state/locality breach of use restrictions excuses the defendants' own future performance under the agreement.

The defendants might refuse to make future payments or sue Missouri to void the settlement.

One potential remedy, the court might order the state/locality to pay back settlement funds spent on non-remediation uses that exceeded the allowable percentages.

Alternatively, a defendant might file a motion to enforce the settlement against the state/locality.

MORE ON ALLOWABLE USES STATE FUNDS

Missouri State Law

“Under no circumstances shall settlement moneys be utilized to fund other services, programs, or expenses not reasonably related to opioid addiction treatment and prevention.”

196.1050. Opioid addiction treatment, any opioid-related settlement moneys to be used for — fund established. — 1. The proceeds of any monetary settlement or portion of a global settlement between the attorney general of the state and any drug manufacturers, distributors, pharmacies, or combination thereof to resolve an opioid-related cause of action against such drug manufacturers, distributors, pharmacies, or combination thereof in a state or federal court shall only be utilized to pay for opioid addiction treatment and prevention services and health care and law enforcement costs related to opioid addiction treatment and prevention. Under no circumstances shall such settlement moneys be utilized to fund other services, programs, or expenses not reasonably related to opioid addiction treatment and prevention. 

2. (1) There is hereby established in the state treasury the "Opioid Addiction Treatment and Recovery Fund", which shall consist of the proceeds of any settlement described in subsection 1 of this section, as well as any funds appropriated by the general assembly, or gifts, grants, donations, or bequests. The state treasurer shall be custodian of the fund. In accordance with sections 30.170 and 30.180, the state treasurer may approve disbursements. The fund shall be a dedicated fund and money in the fund shall be used by the department of mental health, the department of health and senior services, the department of social services, the department of public safety, the department of corrections, and the judiciary for the purposes set forth in subsection 1 of this section.

(2) Notwithstanding the provisions of section 33.080 to the contrary, any moneys remaining in the fund at the end of the biennium shall not revert to the credit of the general revenue fund.

(3) The state treasurer shall invest moneys in the fund in the same manner as other funds are invested. Any interest and moneys earned on such investments shall be credited to the fund.


LEGAL CONSULTATION ON ALLOWABLE USES

Reporting could continue beyond 2038 depending on:

- If settlements are still making payments; and
- The year all settlement funds have been expended by the State of Missouri and local governments





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**MEMORANDUM OF AGREEMENT
FOR

This Agreement is made and entered into upon its execution by both parties as set forth below, with the Effective Date corresponding with the last signature to this Agreement.

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, the Ozarks Transportation Organization ("OTO") has programmed federal Surface Transportation Block Grant Urban (STBG-Urban) funds in the Ozarks Transportation Organization Transportation Improvement; and

WHEREAS Christian County ("County") is wanting to construct operational Improvements at Nicholas and Tracker Intersection in Christian County, ("Project"); and

WHEREAS the OTO has proposed a partnership with the County to provide project administration for the Project

WHEREAS the OTO desires to provide these services for no fee to the County.

NOW, THEREFORE, in exchange for valuable consideration each received from the other the receipt and sufficiency of which is hereby acknowledged, the Parties do hereby agree as follows:

Scope of Services

1. OTO Engineering Services Administration Responsibilities

- a. Project Administration. OTO shall, at its sole cost and expense, act as the project administrator. OTO's project administration assistance includes the following:
 - i. Prepare and manage, at the direction of the County, the initial programming data form completions and submittal; and
 - ii. In cooperation with the County and in compliance with the County's procurement process, select a consultant for Engineering Services consistent with the County's procurement policy and federal grant requirements; and
 - iii. Provide copies of all procurement practices and documentation of costs to the County; and

- iv. With County assistance, prepare the engineering services scope, with the intersection improvement specifications and scope subject to the input and final approval of the County's staff; and
- v. Assist the County in preparing the MoDOT Local Public Agency Contract for Engineering Services; and
- vi. Oversee the engineering services provided by the selected consultant up to the advertisement for construction bids, and report to the County on the status of such services; and
- vii. Oversee the consultant invoicing process to make recommendations to the County for payment of the consultant of these invoices; and
- viii. Prepare and submit grant payment requests to MoDOT with the assistance of County staff.

2. Christian County Responsibilities

- a. **Construction Costs.** The County shall be responsible for all right-of-way, engineering and construction cost associated with the Project. It is explicitly understood by both parties that the services provided in this Memorandum of Agreement are only for project administration services provided by OTO personnel.
- b. The County shall assist with the development of engineering services and construction project scope; and
- c. The County shall participate in regular meetings to ensure project is performed per the terms and conditions of the STBG (Urban) funding award; and
- d. The County shall provide data and staffing support as necessary for the OTO to perform the OTO Engineering Services Administration.

1. **Term.** OTO shall commence project management as soon as practicable after the execution of this Agreement, unless otherwise directed in writing by the County.

The project administration services provided by OTO will be considered complete upon bid award, and upon the County's satisfaction with the outlined deliverables.

2. **Liability and Indemnity.** In no event shall the OTO be liable to the County for special, indirect, or consequential damages, except those caused by the OTO's, or its agent's or official's gross negligence or willful or wanton misconduct. In no event shall the County be liable to the OTO for special, indirect, or consequential damages, except those caused by the County's, or its agent's or official's gross negligence or willful or wanton misconduct.
3. **Conflicts.** No salaried officer or employee of the County or OTO and no member of the County or OTO Board shall have a financial interest, direct or indirect, in this Agreement. A violation of this provision renders the Agreement void. Any applicable federal regulations and applicable provisions in Section 105.450 et seq. RSMo. shall not be violated. OTO covenants that it presently has no interest and shall not acquire any interest, direct or

Indirect, which would conflict in any manner or degree with the performance of services to be performed under this Agreement. OTO further covenants that in the performance of this Agreement no person having such interest shall be employed or compensated by OTO.

4. **Termination for Convenience.** Subject to the rights of the County, as set out in this Agreement, the OTO or the County, by written notice, may terminate this contract, in whole or in part, when it is in the County's or OTO's interest. If this contract is terminated, the OTO shall be liable only for service deliverables of this contract rendered before the effective date of termination. The County, by written notice, may terminate this contract, in whole or in part, when it is in the County's interest.
5. **Compliance with Laws.** OTO agrees to comply with all applicable federal, state, and local laws or rules and regulations applicable to the provision of services and products hereunder. OTO affirmatively states that payment of all local, state, and federal taxes and assessments owed by the OTO is current.
6. **Jurisdiction.** This Agreement and every question arising hereunder shall be construed or determined according to the laws of the State of Missouri. Should any part of this Agreement be litigated, venue shall be proper only in the Circuit Court of Greene County, Missouri.
7. **Title VI.** The sub-grantee, contractor, subcontractor, successor, transferee, and assignee shall comply with Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, which prohibits recipients of federal financial assistance from excluding from a program or activity, denying benefits of, or otherwise discriminating against a person on the basis of race, color, or national origin (42 U.S.C. § 2000d et seq.), as implemented by the Department of the Treasury's Title VI regulations, 31 CFR Part 22, which are herein incorporated by reference and made a part of this contract (or agreement). Title VI also includes protection to persons with "Limited English Proficiency" in any program or activity receiving federal financial assistance, 42 U.S.C. § 2000d et seq., as implemented by the Department of the Treasury's Title VI regulations, 31 CFR Part 22, and herein incorporated by reference and made a part of this contract or agreement.
8. **Entire Agreement.** This Agreement contains the entire agreement of the parties. No modification, amendment, or waiver of any of the provisions of this Agreement shall be effective unless in writing specifically referring hereto and signed by both parties.

This Contract is entered into between Christian County, Missouri on behalf of the Christian County Sheriff's Office ("Agency") and Turn Key Health Clinics, LLC ("Contractor"). The purpose of this Contract is to contract for the Healthcare Personnel and Administration at the Christian County Detention Center in Ozark, Missouri (herein called the "Facility") under the terms and conditions detailed in the Contract.

I. DUTIES AND RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE CONTRACTOR

1.1 SCOPE OF CONTRACT

The Contractor shall be the supplier and/or coordinator of the health care delivery system at the Facility, as set forth herein. The Contractor shall be responsible for medical care for all inmates (except Work Release inmates who shall, when in the Facility, receive only emergency care from the provider) at the Facility up to the limits described in this Contract. The responsibility of the Contractor for the medical care of an inmate commences with the commitment of the inmate to the custody of the Facility and ends with the release of the inmate.

The entire agreement will consist of the Contract Documents. The term "Contract Documents" shall include the Staffing Matrix attached hereto as Exhibit A. Additionally, the Contract Documents will consist of (listed in order from highest to lowest precedence): Change Orders / Amendments (as applicable), Agreement, Response to BAFO (if applicable), Request for BAFO (if applicable), Addenda to RFP, RFP, and the Agency's Proposal (but not the exceptions).

Definitions:

RFP / Addenda to RFP – RFP #2023-25 & Addendums 1&2

Change Order / Amendment – a change to the Contract Documents in a written document signed by the parties after they have signed the Agreement.

BAFO – the Best and Final offer of the Contractor that is in response to a Request for Proposal.

Request for BAFO – The document issued by Christian County that incorporates the terms negotiated by the parties following the opening of the Response to RFP and requests Contractor to make his best and final offer.

1.2 INSURANCE

The Contractor will carry professional liability insurance in minimum amounts of One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000.00) per occurrence and Three Million Dollars (\$3,000,000.00) in the aggregate annually during the entire term and any renewal term of this Contract.

1.3 COMPLIANCE WITH APPLICABLE LAW

The Contractor will comply with the standards set forth by the Missouri Department of Health and Jail Standards for the State of Missouri for the duration of the term of this Agreement with the Agency.

1.4 CONTRACTOR COOPERATION

All Contractor personnel, including the personnel of its subcontractor and agents, will be subject to security background checks and clearances by the Agency. In each instance, the individual and the Contractor will provide such cooperation as may be reasonably required to complete the security check. The Agency agrees to perform such security checks in a timely manner and not unduly delay such checks.

1.5 PHARMACEUTICAL

The Contractor shall provide for pharmaceutical management services to assure the availability of prescribed medications within a reasonable time period of the order of issue being written except where such medications are not readily available in the local community. In order to facilitate the timely administration of medications, the Agency agrees to allow the use of an inmate's home medication, as appropriate, upon the verification of the medication by Contractor personnel.

The Contractor shall provide a method for the recording of the administration of medications by Agency and/or Contractor personnel on a pre-approved form that includes documentation of the fact that inmates are receiving and ingesting their prescribed medications. Medication administration and medication documentation training shall be made available for Agency staff, upon request, for times when Contractor personnel are not at the Facility to administer medications.

The Contractor will negotiate discounted rates with a pharmacy licensed in the State of Missouri. The Contractor will be responsible to pay the costs of all pharmaceutical as required by current applicable law and subject to the Maximum Liability provision listed in Subsection 1.9.

1.6 HOSPITALIZATION, OFF-SITE SERVICES AND SPECIALTY CARE

Contractor will arrange for hospitalization, off-site (outside the Facility) services, and specialty care for inmates who, in the opinion of the treating provider and/or the medical director, require treatment beyond what is provided at the Facility, including dental services. Contractor will defer claims for such services that can be paid by the patient or other responsible party. Claims for such services that are not paid by the patient or other responsible party shall be the responsibility of the Contractor, subject to the Maximum Liability provision listed in Subsection 1.9. However, nothing in this Subsection shall prevent or impede the Agency from transporting inmates whom the Agency determines, in its own discretion, to require emergent medical treatment outside of the Facility.

1.7 LABORATORY AND RADIOLOGY SERVICES

Contractor shall arrange laboratory and radiology services to be performed on-site (within the Facility) to the extent reasonably practicable. The Contractor shall make appropriate off-site arrangements for required laboratory and radiology services that cannot be rendered on-site. Contractor will arrange and coordinate with the Sheriff's Office for the transportation for such

off-site services. Contractor will defer claims for such services that can be paid by the patient or other responsible party. Claims for such services that are not paid by the patient or other responsible party shall be the responsibility of the Contractor, subject to the Maximum Liability provision listed in Subsection 1.9.

1.8 TRANSPORTATION

The cost of emergency medical transportation will be considered an off-site service per Section 1.6. Costs for such services shall be the responsibility of the Contractor, subject to the Maximum Liability provision listed in Subsection 1.9. All other non-emergent transportation relating to the provision of health services shall be also be the responsibility of the Agency, not the Contractor.

1.9 FINANCIAL LIABILITY FOR NON-CONTRACTOR SERVICES

Contractor's maximum liability for services pursuant to Sections 1.5, 1.6, 1.7, and 1.8, including but not limited to hospitalizations, inmate transportation, off-site medical care, diagnostic services, specialty consultation and services, off-site dental services, medical waste, medications, required prosthesis, and individual medical devices shall be \$33,000.00, and all financial liability in excess of the \$33,000.00 cap shall be the responsibility of the Agency, not the Contractor.

1.10 INMATES FROM OTHER JURISDICTIONS

The Contractor will provide on-site services for inmates incarcerated at the Facility for the Missouri Department of Corrections, Missouri municipalities, the U.S. Marshals, the Federal Bureau of Prisons, and/or other custodial jurisdictions. However, hospitalizations, off-site services, specialty services, and pharmaceutical costs associated with inmates from other jurisdictions shall not be the responsibility of the Contractor. The Contractor shall promptly notify the Jail Administrator for any needed pharmaceutical, specialty service or off-site services for such inmates and shall provide documentation of required treatment to the custodial jurisdiction as requested. Upon receipt, the Contractor shall submit all related bills to the Agency for appropriate processing.

1.11 IMMUNITY FROM LIABILITY

Up to the limits stated in Mo. Ann. Stat. § 537.610, the Contractor agrees to indemnify and to hold the Agency harmless for, from, and against claims, suits, reasonable attorney's fees, damages, or injuries to persons or property or other liabilities arising out of the sole negligence of the Contractor or the Contractor's personnel to properly provide medical care or administration pursuant to the terms of this Contract; including but not limited to claims for violation of privacy, medical malpractice, governmental enforcement or remedial actions, federal or state discrimination claims and tort actions.

Immunity from liability and/or indemnity shall not extend to the Agency for the actions, omission of action, neglect, the prevention of any person from receiving medical care, or the lack of personnel training, by the Agency or any Agency personnel or agents.

The Contractor shall not be responsible for any claims arising from the negligence or torts on the part of the Agency or any Agency personnel or agents in promptly and/or accurately presenting a

person to the appropriate Contractor's personnel or independent contractors if it should have been reasonably known that the individual was in need of medical attention, or in denying the Contractor or its personnel access to treat any such individuals in need of medical attention. The Contractor shall not be responsible for the failure of the Agency or Agency personnel or agents to obtain emergency medical care in the event Contractor personnel are not available at the Facility.

The Agency shall hold harmless the Contractor and the Contractor's officers and personnel against any loss or damage, including attorney's fees or other litigation costs, caused or necessitated by the sole negligence of the Agency, Agency employees and agents, and/or other vendors which is related to medical treatment or care.

The terms and provisions of this Section 1.11 shall survive the termination of this Contract.

1.12 THIRD PARTY PAYORS

The Contractor shall assist with obtaining private health insurance information, whenever possible, to help ensure claims are billed appropriately for applicable off-site and specialty care medical expenses. However, in no event shall any patient be denied access to appropriate medical care due to a lack of insurance coverage, nor shall insurance coverage and/or a patient's financial condition be taken into consideration when rendering medical care or in the exercise of medical decision-making by the Contractor or its personnel.

1.13 INMATE MEDICAL FEE FOR SERVICE SYSTEM

The Contractor and Agency may implement an inmate fee for medical services program for medical encounters as directed by the Agency. Any inmate charges will be established by the Agency in accordance with Missouri State Statutes. Fees for services shall be collected directly by the Agency and will be utilized by the Agency. The Contractor will not be responsible to collect any of the fees from the inmates.

1.14 NEGOTIATION OF DISCOUNTS

Contractor shall use its best efforts to negotiate discounts for medical services and pharmaceuticals. The Agency will be allowed to use the contractual discounts negotiated by the Contractor.

1.15 PERSONNEL RECORD KEEPING

The Contractor shall, upon request, provide to the Agency proof of licenses and/or certificates for all Contractor professional staff. Personnel files of Contractor's employees assigned to the Facility shall be maintained at the Contractor's corporate office and shall be available to the Agency upon written request.

1.16 HEALTHCARE PERSONNEL SERVICES PROVIDED

All medical and mental health personnel providing services through the Contractor under this Contract shall be the employees and/or agents of the Contractor and not of the Agency. Such

individuals shall hereby be referred to as the "Healthcare Personnel". All wages, worker's compensation, insurance, benefits, vacations, and claims of any kind relating to the Healthcare Personnel provided by the Contractor shall be the sole responsibility of the Contractor and not of the Agency. Healthcare Personnel associated with the terms of this contract shall not include employees and/or agents of the Agency.

1. Contractor shall provide medical unit coverage pursuant to Exhibit A:
2. A physician or midlevel provider who will provide 24 hours a day, seven days a week, EMERGENCY on-call coverage for consultation on an as needed basis.
2. The Healthcare Personnel shall perform medical and dental intake screenings while at the Facility. Intake screenings performed by detention staff while Healthcare Personnel are not at the Facility shall be reviewed by Healthcare Personnel within forty-eight hours of being conducted. Inmates identified with significant health concerns will be scheduled for follow-up care, as appropriate.
3. Healthcare Personnel shall administer medications, as prescribed, while at the Facility;
4. Healthcare Personnel shall conduct sick call triage and follow-up, as indicated; and
5. Healthcare Personnel shall provide appropriate and timely response to medical needs and emergencies during regularly scheduled hours at the Facility.

1.17 SATISFACTION WITH HEALTHCARE PERSONNEL

In recognition with the sensitive nature of the Facility's operation, if the Agency becomes dissatisfied with any member of the Contractor's Healthcare Personnel, the Agency shall provide Contractor written notice of such dissatisfaction and the reason(s) therefore. Following receipt of such notice, Contractor shall use reasonable efforts to resolve the dissatisfaction. If the problem is not resolved to the satisfaction of the Agency within ten (10) business days following the Contractor's receipt of the notice, Contractor shall remove the individual from providing services at the Facility within a reasonable timeframe considering the affects of such removal on Contractor's ability to deliver healthcare services and recruitment/hiring of an acceptable replacement.

1.18 POLICIES AND PROCEDURES / PROTOCOLS

A written manual of the Agency and Contractor's standardized policies and defined procedures will be available at all times for the Contractor's personnel. The Contractor's nursing protocols shall be devised and approved by a physician licensed in the State of Missouri. Policies and procedures and nursing protocols will be reviewed and revised as necessary.

1.19 NON-INMATE HEALTH SERVICES

Non-inmate health services shall be provided in the form of emergency care for Facility staff and visitors for the purpose of stabilizing the condition and arranging for transport. Emergency services include first aid, assessment, stabilization and the coordination of transport of

employees or visitors who become ill or injured in the Facility.

The Contractor shall make available the Hepatitis B vaccination program and annual Tuberculosis Skin Testing (TST) for all Facility staff as requested by the Sheriff. However, the Agency will bear the cost of the vaccine and serum.

1.20 EMERGENCY ASSISTANCE

The Contractor shall, in times of emergency or threat thereof, whether accidental, natural or man-made, provide medical assistance to the Facility to the extent or degree required by policies and procedures.

1.21 TESTIFYING IN COURT

Contractor personnel shall be aware that they might, from time to time, be subpoenaed to testify in court or at a deposition regarding medical treatment. Contractor will keep the Agency informed of any and all requests.

1.22 MEDICAL RECORDS REQUIREMENTS

An electronic health record consistent with state regulations and community standards of practice shall be maintained for each inmate held beyond the first appearance in court for services rendered following the inmate's assignment to a housing area. These records shall be kept separate from the jail confinement records of the inmate on a server designated and owned by the Agency.

In any case where medical care is at issue, or in any criminal or civil litigation where the physical or mental condition of an inmate is at issue, the Contractor shall make accessible to the Agency such records and, upon request, provide copies. The Contractor additionally acknowledges compliance with and understanding of all applicable HIPAA requirements as they apply to correctional facilities.

The Contractor acknowledges and agrees that all records prepared or acquired by the Contractor during performance of services under the Contract are the property of the Christian County Sheriff's Office. The Contractor shall be considered the records custodian during the duration of the Contract. Upon the termination of this Contract, all inmate medical records shall remain in the care and custody of the Agency. Inactive medical records will be maintained in accordance with the laws of the State of Missouri.

The Contractor shall be responsible for costs associated with leasing and/or maintenance of the electronic health record software program. However, all costs associated with computer hardware and server maintenance and/or replacement and software other than the electronic health record program shall be the responsibility of the Agency.

II. DUTIES OF AGENCY

2.1 MONTHLY REIMBURSEMENT FOR SERVICES

The reimbursement for the Contract shall be paid by the Agency to the Contractor on a monthly basis. The monthly reimbursement for the month of February 2024 shall be in the amount of **Fifty-Eight Thousand, Seven Hundred and Sixty-Nine dollars and Eighty-Two cents (\$58,769.82)**. All monthly reimbursements shall be eligible to be pro-rated for any partial months and subject to any reconciliation as applicable. The first payment for the month of February 2024 shall be paid to the Contractor by the 1st day of March 2024 for the services administered in the month of February. All subsequent payments shall be paid in the full amount by the Agency to the Contractor by the 1st day of each month for services rendered the previous month.

This Agreement shall cover services provided by the Contractor for the Agency with a facility average daily population (ADP) up to 150 inmates. The ADP will be calculated as the monthly total for all inmates in the jail at 8:00am each day divided by the number of days in that month. Should the ADP exceed 150 inmates for three consecutive months, the Agency agrees to renegotiate the terms of the Contract in good faith.

The Contract shall be subject to an annual increase for the reimbursement for services in the amount not to exceed CPI beginning February 1, 2025 and each subsequent year thereafter.

2.2 USE OF FACILITY, EQUIPMENT AND SUPPLIES

The Agency shall be responsible for providing the non-exclusive use and access to certain office equipment (phones, computers, etc.), office supplies (chart folders, pens, paper, etc.) durable medical equipment (exam tables, sinks, cabinets, etc.), internet connectivity, and phone service required for the administrative operation of the medical unit. Agency agrees that the Contractor will be provided appropriate space in the Facility to perform all required duties and that the Contractor will be allowed use of the medical office areas, medical equipment, and medical supplies currently at the facility at the initiation of services.

In the event additional durable office or medical equipment needs to be purchased, or existing equipment needs to be repaired, it will be the Agency's responsibility to purchase/repair the required equipment, and it will be owned by the Agency. Provided that, Contractor shall provide and bear the cost of standard disposable medical supplies.

2.3 MEDICAL WASTE

The Agency shall be responsible to arrange for the disposal of medical waste, including infectious or hazardous medical waste. The material must be removed from the Facility and disposed of as regulated by federal, state and local laws. Costs for such services shall be the responsibility of the Agency.

III. CONTRACT TERM

The term of this Contract shall commence on February 1, 2024 and will continue through December 31, 2024. The Contract shall then be eligible for four (4) additional 1 year periods

upon mutual agreement of both parties.

IV. CONTRACT TERMINATION

4.1 TERMINATION

The Agency or Contractor may terminate the Contract for cause or out of convenience at any time by giving written notice to the Contractor of termination, which such notice shall be given not less than thirty (30) calendar days prior to the stated effective date of termination.

4.2 PAYMENT UPON TERMINATION

Upon termination of this Contract for any reason, prior to the end of the then existing term, the Contractor will be paid up to the effective termination date such sums and expenses, prorated as necessary, in accordance with those monthly fees described in paragraph 2.1.

4.3 PROPERTY UPON TERMINATION

All health records, Agency policies and procedures, and Agency manuals shall be the property of the Agency and, at the termination of the Contract, shall remain the property of the Agency without further obligation.

V. GENERAL TERMS AND CONDITIONS

5.1 ALTERATIONS TO CONTRACT

Any alterations, variations, modifications, or waivers of the provisions of the Contract will be valid only if they are reduced to writing, agreed upon by the parties, and attached to the original Contract.

5.2 FORCE MAJEURE

Neither party shall be liable in damages or have the right to terminate this Agreement for any delay or default in performing hereunder if such delay or default is caused by conditions beyond its control including, but not limited to Acts of God, Government restrictions (including the denial or cancellation of any export or other necessary license), wars, insurrections and/or any other cause beyond the reasonable control of the party whose performance is affected.

5.3 INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR STATUS

It is mutually understood and agreed, and it is the intent of the parties hereto that an independent contractor relationship be and is hereby established under the terms and conditions of this Contract. Nothing in this Contract shall be construed to create an agency relationship, an employer/employee relationship, a joint venture relationship, or any other relationship allowing the Agency to exercise control or direction over the manner or methods by which the Contractor, its employees, agents or subcontractors perform hereunder, or the Contractor to exercise control or direction over the manner or methods by which the Agency and its employees, agents or subcontractors perform hereunder, other than as provided in this Contract.

5.4 SUBCONTRACTING

In order to discharge its obligation hereunder, the Contractor may engage certain physicians as independent contractors rather than employees ("Contract Professionals"). The Contractor shall not engage any Contract Professionals that do not meet the applicable professional licensing requirements and the Contractor shall exercise administrative supervision over such Contract Professionals as necessary to ensure the strict fulfillment of the obligations contained in this Contract. Services provided by Contract Professionals under this Contract shall be provided in a manner reasonably consistent with the independent medical judgment the Contract Professionals are required to exercise.

5.5 AGENCY STATUTORY DELEGATION

For purposes of asserting any statutory rights afforded to the Agency or the Facility to pay providers for medical services at certain reduced rates, Agency designates the Contractor as its agent to assert such rights and privileges.

5.6 EQUAL EMPLOYMENT OPPORTUNITY

The Contractor will not discriminate against any employee or applicant for employment because of race, color, religion, sex, ancestry, national origin, place of birth, marital status, sexual orientation, age or handicap unrelated to a bona fide occupational qualification of the position or because of status as a disabled veteran or Vietnam-Era veteran. Contractor will distribute copies of its commitment not to discriminate to all persons who participate in recruitment, screening, referral and selection of job applicants, and to prospective job applicants.

5.7 WAIVER OF BREACH

The waiver of either party of a breach or violation of any provision of this Contract shall not operate as, or be construed to be, a waiver of any subsequent breach of the same or other provision hereof.

5.8 NOTICES

Any notice of termination, requests, demands or other communications under this Contract shall be in writing and shall be deemed delivered: (a) when delivered in person to a representative the parties listed : (b) 3 days after mailing when mailed by first-class certified mail, return receipt requested, addressed to the party at the address below; or (c) upon confirmation of receipt if sent by electronic means or facsimile to the parties listed :

Either party may change such address or phone number from time to time by providing written notice as provided above.

5.9 GOVERNING LAW

This Contract shall be governed by and construed in accordance with the laws of the State of Missouri regard to the conflicts of laws or rules of any jurisdiction.

5.10 COUNTERPARTS

This Contract may be executed in several counterparts, each of which shall be considered an original and all of which shall constitute but one and the same instrument.

5.11 TITLE OF PARAGRAPHS AND INTERPRETATION

Titles of paragraphs are inserted solely for convenience of reference and shall not be deemed to limit, expand or otherwise affect the provisions to which they relate. Further, as used in this Contract, the word "or" shall have the conjunctive as well as the disjunctive meaning and refers to alternatives that are not necessarily exclusive. As used in this Contract, references to "include" and similar terms shall be construed as if followed by the phrase "without limitation."

5.12 SEVERABILITY

In the event that any one or more provisions of this Contract shall, for any reason, be held to be invalid, illegal or unenforceable in any respect, such invalidity, illegality or unenforceability shall not affect any other provision of this Contract and this Contract shall be construed and enforced as if such invalid, illegal or unenforceable provision had never been contained herein.

5.13 ENTIRE CONTRACT



AMENDMENT #2**

This Amendment shall serve as a revision to the Contract for Healthcare Personnel and Administration (the "Main Agreement") between the **Christian County Sheriff's Office** ("Agency") and **Turn Key Health Clinics, LLC, dba TK Health** ("Contractor") which initiated on February 1, 2024 at the Christian County Detention Center.

In consideration to the mutual covenants contained herein, the receipt and sufficiency of which are hereby acknowledged, it is agreed upon as follows:

1. The terms and conditions of this Amendment, as set forth, shall be effective as of February 1, 2026.
2. Section 1.16, Exhibit A of the Main Agreement, shall be amended to add 20 RN hours per week. See Exhibit A on last page of this amendment.
3. Section 2.1 shall be deleted in its entirety and replaced as follows:

The reimbursement for the Contract shall be paid by the Agency to the Contractor on a monthly basis. The monthly reimbursement for the month of February 2026 shall be in the amount of **Sixty-Eight Thousand, Nine Hundred Sixty-Two dollars and Eleven cents (\$68,962.11)**. All monthly reimbursements shall be eligible to be pro-rated for any partial months and subject to any reconciliation as applicable. The first payment for the month of February 2026 shall be paid to the Contractor by the 1st day of March 2026 for the services administered in the month of February. All subsequent payments shall be paid in the full amount by the Agency to the Contractor by the 1st day of each month for services rendered the previous month.

This Agreement shall cover services provided by the Contractor for the Agency with a facility average daily population (ADP) up to 150 inmates. The ADP will be calculated as the monthly total for all inmates in the jail at 8:00am each day divided by the number of days in that month. Should the ADP exceed 150 inmates for three consecutive months, the Agency agrees to renegotiate the terms of the Contract in good faith.

The Contract shall be subject to an annual increase for the reimbursement for services in the amount not to exceed the preceding December CPI for the St. Louis area beginning February 1, 2027 and each subsequent year thereafter.

4. In all other respects, the terms and conditions of the Main Agreement and any subsequent amendments or renewals thereto shall continue unchanged and remain in full force and effect.



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
